A Glimpse of Hope

It is hard to believe it has been nearly one year since our lives were interrupted by the Coronavirus pandemic. Like the Israelites crossing the Red Sea on dry ground as they fled Egypt, we had no idea how long we would wander in our new digital surroundings. Maybe six weeks, we thought as we made plans that would carry us through the initial phases of quarantine, social distancing, and isolation. Like the Israelites though, our journey through the Covid wilderness has

extended longer than we anticipated and it has ushered in a prolonged season of grief. Through the stories of scripture we witness the transformation of the people as they move from captivity to freedom, from struggle to promise. This transformation came with trials, with frustration, with anger, and with loss. In these last twelve months we have said goodbye to our in-person worship services, our hymnals, our

fellowship meals, and meetings in Books on the Corner. We have been deprived of hugs, handshakes, and casual yet meaningful conversations in the hallways that through God's own mystery sustain us for days and weeks to follow. We have said goodbyes and hellos as our staff team has changed. There have been endings and there have been beginnings. Through it all, we have found ways to worship, serve our neighbors, and grow together as followers of lesus.

As vaccine distribution continues, North Carolina's hospitalizations and daily percent positives seem to be trending in a very positive direction. These are two major markers that the COVID Think Tank, the deacons, and staff have been looking at to guide our decisions about when and how to resume in-person worship services and gatherings. Our plan right now is to offer one in-person worship service, outdoors, on Easter Sunday, April 4. That service will begin at 10:00 a.m. and will be live streamed to our YouTube channel. If you are comfortable joining us in person, you can bring a chair or blanket to sit on the lawn in the picnic area near the Fellowship Hall or from the parking lot tuned into our FM station 90.3.

It is our hope that after Easter, we can resume a regular rhythm of in-person worship services along with our weekly online service. Because our staff and volunteer

capacities are limited, we expect some changes to the online service in order to accommodate the addition of the in-person worship offerings. We are excited about these next steps and look forward to how the Spirit of God is at work within, around, and among us in this season of new life. We thank you for your grace and patience with us as we once again, enter into uncharted territory.




Our Children Journey through Lent

Our children and their families are journeying through Lent together with their Lent at Home kits provided by the Preschool & Children's Committee. We started off our journey together with pancakes on Shrove Tuesday and finger labyrinth devotion on Ash Wednesday. Our theme this year is *Reflections* on the Heart. Each week, families read scripture and have conversations about their true treasures. Families are also sent an email and a video with a message from me and a song from Christian. You can check out these videos on our YouTube channel or find them in your Sunday email if you want to see what our children are learning.

We are also filling our Lenten Treasure Vessels as we journey through Lent together. Each family has chosen a vessel to place on their kitchen table and each week during Lent, we add a new item to it. So far, we have added a small heart with a black cross to remind us of Ash Wednesday; a treasure chest to remind us that our true treasures like love and family can't fit in a treasure box; and a question mark to remind us of young Jesus' curiosity and yearning to learn more about God and scripture. Children also received some craft supplies so that they can craft their way through Lent with me as we practice self-care together.

It may be too soon for this, but I'm going to be honest – there are some things about this "new normal" that I'm going to miss when we go back to the "normal normal". For one thing, if I were the only person on the road, a trip from my garage to the preschool parking lot would take 30 minutes. Back in the good ol' days, my morning commute took anywhere from 50 minutes to an hour. My COVID commute?? 32 minutes! I'm going to miss the leisurely pace of my new morning routine. And Zoom meetings? I know those of you working from home can't wait to be off the computer and back in person for church services and committee meetings. But back in February, when the Preschool Committee met at 6:30 p.m. and it was DARK and 27 degrees outside, I logged onto Zoom from the warmth and comfort of my home. I'm going to miss that!

But what I think I'll miss the most when normal returns is how we welcome our preschoolers into the building this year. Before covid, morning drop off felt like organized chaos! Half of our staff were helping children out of cars and down halls. Parents were walking children in. Multiple families were in and out of multiple entrances. Children were running in the halls, some were crying. SO many things happening at once! COVID stopped us in our tracks. Our new protocols require that all our parents stay outside the building and every child come in through carpool. Each morning, I go out and do a health screening of each child while they sit in their cars. Aside from the cold morning temperatures, it has become my favorite time of the preschool day. I love that I get to speak with every child and every parent every morning. I've met family pets, visiting grandparents, older siblings. I see what some of the children are having for



breakfast (and it explains A LOT), get a preview of their "show & tell" and get the early warning on which children will require an extra dose of patience on a given day. I've had parents share prayer concerns in the carpool line and also had children explain why they're grumpy ("mom didn't wash my underpants with the bananas on them, so I'm wearing plain blue ones." 'heavy sigh'). I've always seen them every day, but as a whole group. This year has allowed me the time to see and speak to each child and each parent individually every day. What a gift! I'll miss that one-on-one time when it's gone.

Don't get me wrong, I'm looking forward to more than I'll miss! I'm excited to invite parents back in to volunteer, excited to offer an actual hug and excited to smile at a child with my whole face, not just my eyes. Most of all, I look forward to gathering all our littles for one large chapel service each week, to hear "This is the Day" sung in that loud screaming way children have of singing. That first chapel service will put a great big smile on my unmasked face, and it can't come soon enough.

But maybe we could keep those committee meetings during the winter on Zoom??


Eagle Scout Project Benefits Church & Community

Its three suspended bronze bells remind us of the Trinity. At the top of the tower, the three main support masts draw together in a way that reminds us of folded hands in prayer.


