Looking back, it's funny to think about what the "new things" were going to be. You know what they say... If you want to hear God laugh, just tell God your plans." Fifteen months ago our "new things" would be search committees and a yearlong kindness campaign. Now, those seem like small programmatic adjustments and comfortable adaptations to what always was.

Like the Hebrew people in their seasons of wilderness, we have been humbled in so many ways that we are (perhaps) finally able to catch a glimpse of what God might be doing to renew God's church. On May 12, 2021 many of us gathered online to hear a presentation about "Church Renewal Post COVID." In that

During the months of April and May, we began offering in-person worship services outdoors on the first Sundays each month and in our sanctuary the other Sundays. Those services were held at 10:00 a.m. We have continued to offer our prerecorded, online worship service which is posted to our church website and YouTube channel each Sunday at 8:30 a.m.

When we began offering the inperson services, we committed to a spirit of openness and we promised that we would listen and learn from your feedback. Here's what we've learned during this 2-month period of time:

- 1. We love being together for worship. Even with the protocols that remain in place for COVID-19, there is nothing that replaces the feeling of worshipping God in community with one another.
- 2. Having the opportunity to worship before Sunday school allows musicians, readers, deacons, ushers, sound & light team members, and other worship leaders an opportunity to fully participate in Sunday school, without having to leave 20 or 30 minutes early.
- 3. The 10:00 a.m time for worship has posed significant challenges for Sunday school classes. Many SS leaders and class members have requested slight changes to that time.
- 4. While we all love the prerecorded worship service, we
 do not have the capacity to
 continue to record and edit that
 service, along with holding the
 in-person service each week. It
 has quickly become too much
 for our lay leaders and staff who
 are recording each week on
 Thursday and Friday nights, then
 editing on Saturdays in order to
 post on Sundays.

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Music at Greystone

Throughout Lent and now into this Easter season, our music ministry programs have continued to safely and creatively keep our shared song alive and well. Our combined choirs continue to regularly offer "virtual choir" videos for worship and we are grateful for those individual musicians who are still routinely coming together to provide culturally and stylistically diverse music for online worship. Tim Hendrix offered a profoundly worshipful set of piano performances and written reflections for Holy Week, and



these can be found on our **church blog**. Our outdoor, in-person Easter service was a joyful day for our musicians, as our Handbell Choir and many of our musicians had the opportunity to lead music in worship with a congregation for the first time in over a year! We are thankful for the beautiful flowering cross that members of our Worship Ministry Committee prepared and assembled during our Easter service.

In resuming in-person worship services, we are easing back into our musical offerings indoors. Throughout the pandemic, we have experienced zero transmission of COVID-19 through our musical activities and I am hopeful that our decisions moving forward will help continue that trend. While all of our musicians at in-person services are fully vaccinated and appropriately distanced, we will continue to monitor national and state health guidelines in discerning how to safely allow more in-person singing and wind instrument playing. The CBFNC Music Advisory Team, on which I serve, will also be an important resource.

Greystone's Memorial Garden

If you haven't previously explored our Memorial Garden or have not visited it in a while, take some time to stroll the welcoming, winding sidewalk up the gentle slope near the Sawmill Road portion of our campus toward the linear labyrinth and the columbarium. Linger for awhile in this place of peace and beauty which calls us to reflect upon God's gift of the good earth and invites us to walk and talk with God.

Since its dedication on September 20, 2009, the garden, which surrounds the columbarium building, patio (labyrinth), and bell tower, serves to remind us of the gardens in which Jesus retreated to pray. Its flora changes



with the seasons. Notice the encore azaleas, which bloom in both spring and fall, hydrangeas, the Easter lilies (which will bloom briefly in May), and various other flowering plants and trees. About 25 azaleas, which were donated a few years ago by WRAL, were planted to add to those which were planted previously. Easter lilies, used during our Easter worship services, have also been added at different times, as were hydrangeas in April of this year. A couple of lovely potted plantings, recently installed, grace the columbarium entrance.

Along with the help of landscaping crews and volunteers over the years, we have sought to maintain this area as a welcoming place of rest for those who enter the columbarium to honor loved ones who have passed, or to anyone who seeks a quiet time of meditation. The litany from the Dedication of the Memorial Garden in 2009 proclaims, "With faithfulness to God, and as disciples of Jesus Christ, we come to this place to seek comfort, consolation, and care for our souls and the souls of those whom we love."

So come on by – anytime. Enjoy this special retreat of rest. You might also catch the chiming of the hour from the bell tower's carillon or an old hymn which may play at various times throughout the day. Sense God's presence and eternal assurances.

New "Welcome House" Project Under Development

The Missions Committee and the Spirit of Justice Ad Hoc Team are pleased to announce that as part of our encourager church relationship with Marc and Kim Wyatt, Greystone Baptist Church is developing and endorsing a new Welcome House project. This new concept is an outgrowth of the existing Welcome Houses which specifically meet a need for refugee families. The new Welcome House project is flexible to include not only refugee families, but any families who are experiencing a housing crisis.

It is designed to identify available housing (unused parsonages, rental properties owned by church members, etc.) that can be made available at affordable, less than market rates. Beyond housing, the encourager churches that adopt this new Welcome House model will designate a sponsor who will work with each family, helping them to move into more permanent housing. The third component of this new iteration of Welcome House is that each family supported by this program will have a hospitality group that will pray for them and walk alongside them while the family is living in their Welcome House property.

In response to this feedback...

The staff and deacons, recommend the following changes, beginning Sunday, June 13.

- 1. In-person worship will be held at 9:30 a.m. each Sunday morning. First Sundays will continue to be outdoors (weather permitting) and subsequent Sundays will be indoors, in our Sanctuary. We will continue to wear masks and practice social distancing.
- 2. In lieu of the pre-recorded service, the 9:30 service will be live-streamed each week. It will be available on our YouTube channel and our church website live (beginning at 9:30 a.m). A recording of the live-stream will be available on YouTube and our church website for those who are unable to tune in live.
- 3. Adult Sunday school classes are invited to begin returning to campus for their weekly meetings. With the 9:30 worship time, we anticipate most classes will begin at 10:30 or 10:45 a.m. We also believe that many classes will continue to meet virtually. Some may consider a hybrid model, with some members joining in person from the church campus and others joining online. Classes considering in person or hybrid meetings should contact Annette at the church office at office@greystonechurch.org for scheduling and space reservation.
- 4. Through the summer months of June, July, and August, there will be no weekly Sunday school for children and youth. They will continue meeting virtually and for special, planned, fellowship gatherings as communicated in emails from Pastor April Alston.
- 5. While we do not know what the future will hold, it is our hope, our prayer, and our (tentative) plan to return to a full schedule with faith formation, fellowship, mission, and worship opportunities for people of all ages in early September.

In addition to these changes...

Here are some other important things to note:

- 1. The ministerial staff will continue teleworking throughout the summer and plan to return to a more traditional schedule of in-office working hours mid to late August.
- 2. Ministerial staff members **are** available for in-person appointments. These need to be scheduled in advance with each minister.
- 3. Steve, our Property Manager, continues to work daily, on campus. Because his job requires him to move throughout the campus, he is not always available to answer the door.
- 4. Annette, our Administrative Assistant will be working in the office two days per week (typically Mondays and Wednesdays) and teleworking on Tuesdays and Thursdays. If you need to come by the church office, please feel free to schedule a time with Annette by emailing her at office@greystonechurch.org. Appointments are available between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. on the days she is there.
- 5. The office will be closed (as always) on Fridays.
- 6. Even though our office hours are still adjusted for reasons associated with the pandemic, we would love to see you! Please do not hesitate to reach out and make an appointment with any of our staff!

Looking back and also looking ahead, it is hard to believe all the ways we are being renewed and re-made. Who would have imagined these "new things" that are springing forth? I know that change is always hard, and the changes outlined above will be no different. It is my belief, my hope, and my prayer that as we continue to listen and learn from one another during this season of transformation, we will grow in faith and grow in relationship. God is indeed making us new.

And even though we may not have been ready for all of this "new"... there is a good measure of grace tied up in it. For that we say,
